IAM MEMBERS AT PRATT AND WHITNEY IN CONNECTICUT VOTE TO REJECT COMPANY OFFER, STRIKE FOR FAIR CONTRACT

Approximately 3,000 members at IAM Union Locals 700 and 1746 in the greater Hartford, Conn., area have overwhelmingly rejected the company's offer. The current agreement remains in effect through 11:59 p.m. ET on Sunday, May 4, when a strike will begin.

"Our committee worked tirelessly to advance our member's voices to the company, and the company simply failed to bring to the table an agreement that we felt comfortable recommending to our membership," said IAM District 26 Directing Business Representative Jeff Santini. "At the end of the day, the membership always has the final say."

According to the negotiating committee, the company failed to adequately address the membership's top concerns about wage and retirement security and offered nothing to improve job security.

"Pratt and Whitney is a powerhouse in military and commercial aerospace products because our membership makes it so," said IAM Eastern Territory General Vice President David Sullivan. "This offer does not address the membership concerns, and the membership made their decision — we will continue to fight for a fair contract."

The IAM Union looks forward to returning to the table



with Pratt and Whitney's leadership to continue pressing for the needs and enhancements that ensure the well-being and livelihoods of Pratt and Whitney workers.

DON'T LET TRUMP'S ANTI-WORKER AGENDA COME TO CANADA

Donald Trump has launched one of the most aggressive assaults on workers' rights in modern U.S. history. With the stroke of a pen, his executive order has wiped out collective bargaining rights for over one million federal workers. This unprecedented attack to exempt workers from union protections is part of a larger effort to silence unions that have "declared war on President Trump's agenda," according to a fact sheet released by the White House.

But this isn't just an attack on American workers — it's a warning sign for all of us in Canada.

We have seen what happens when governments attack unions: workers lose their rights, wages stagnate, and public services suffer. The right-wing propaganda machine has convinced millions of Americans to vote against their own best interests, and we can't let that happen here. Trump's actions set a dangerous precedent that could fuel similar anti-worker policies in Canada.

PSAC's For You, Canada campaign is about fighting back against these threats. We need a government that respects workers' Charter right to join a union, upholds their access to free and fair collective bargaining, and ensures that all workers have access to fair labour standards in their workplaces. Public service workers keep Canada running – safeguarding borders, ensuring food and water safety, assisting farmers, delivering social programs, and responding to emergencies like wildfires. Without strong unions, these essential services are at risk.

As Canada faces an important election, we must decide: do we strengthen the services that people in Canada rely on, or do we allow reckless cuts to weaken our communities?

This election, we need every PSAC member to

vote for public services, for strong labour rights, and for a government that supports workers — not one that undermines them.

Your vote matters. Our future depends on it.



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CANADA POST WORKERS COULD STRIKE AGAIN SOON. HERE'S WHY

After striking workers took to picket lines and a "couple million" packages piled up just before Christmas last year, Canada Post is back at the negotiation table with the union representing its employees this week.

The Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) and the postal service are trying to reach a deal on a new collective agreement before their old one runs out on May 22.

The strike in late 2024 ended when the Canada Industrial Relations Board ordered the two sides back to work on Dec. 15. It also extended the collective agreements between the workers and their employer until May 22, which is what employees have been working under ever since.

Labour Minister Steven MacKinnon also established an industrial inquiry commission in order to get a better understanding of Canada Post's financial troubles, and why negotiations have not been successful thus far. That commission's findings will come out on May 15.

The extension of the old collective agreement and its nearing expiry date are why the two sides are negotiating once again.

In other words, the order back to work was more like a pause of the strike, according to Hena Singh, an employment lawyer and mediator.

"We had a pause in the negotiations and the government sent everyone back to work to go through this commission process. And then now they're all coming back to the table," Singh said.

Singh adds that while it's not abnormal for the government to order employees back to work — that's how the recent rail workers strike and the B.C. port strike ended, for example — it is uncommon for them to appoint a commission to get to the root of the issue.

If the two sides don't come to an agreement by May 22, Canada Post workers could go on strike again.



Since December, the two sides have had a few meetings to try and reach a deal. Talks on March 1 and 2 ended without any new agreement. The meetings on Wednesday and Thursday of this week were the next rounds of negotiations.

UNIFOR AEROSPACE COUNCIL STATEMENT ON U.S. TARIFFS

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The sudden and unprovoked Trump initiated trade war between the United States and Canada as well as the inflammatory comments made about Canada's sovereignty have shocked Canadian aerospace workers.

As the trade war intensifies, our union remains focused on advocating for the comprehensive recommendations in Unifor's aerospace policy adopted last year. That includes the creation of a national aerospace industrial strategy in Canada. Unifor's Aerospace Council expects all levels of government to work with our union and adopt our vision for creating a strong and resilient aerospace sector that prioritizes protecting and creating good aerospace jobs. The union has also called on federal and provincial governments to intensify our response to U.S. tariffs specifically aimed at supporting the industry. This response must include negotiations with the European Union, to manufacture aerospace and military equipment in Canada, engage in joint research, development and innovation initiatives and secure preferred procurement status for Canada.

U.S. and Canadian aerospace supply chains are highly integrated. Canada maintains significant exposure to the U.S. market and exports close to 60% of the aircrafts, engines, and aerospace parts it manufactures to the United States.

Threats made by the Trump administration will have a direct impact on the industry going forward. The Council strongly opposes such disruptions and maintains hope that they will prove temporary but acknowledges the need to respond.

Targeted and strategic retaliatory measures are essential in the fight against Trump's trade war. Canada must also renew its approach to the aerospace industry with an emphasis on resiliency, sovereignty, and the need to seek out new partnerships.
